PDATE: Mid-Iowa officially designated as an Economic Development District

's official. The Mid-Iowa region has been designated as an Economic Development District (EDD) by the U.S. Economic Development dministration (EDA).

kewise, the EDA designated the Mid-Iowa Planning Alliance for Community Development, aka MIPA, as the official supporting rganization of the EDD. MIPA will offer its members and partner organizations a range of services, such as grant writing, grant dministrations, technical support, and other planning services.

orty-eight jurisdictions have joined MIPA as members thus far, and their collective populations represent more than 80 percent of the lid-lowa region's population. Additional jurisdictions may join later in the year, as well. More details are at widowaplanningalliance.com/membership.
